Society News

The newsletter

As reported in issue 341, the society's newsletter will be sent out in e-mail form from 1 October 2017, when subscriptions are due. Members who wish to receive a paper copy of the newsletter will have to <u>opt in</u> to the postal system, which will cost an **additional £8** per year. The committee has taken the decision to end the hand delivery system, which is very labour intensive, because of rising costs. For some time now, all new members have had only the e-mail option, & the 2017/18 membership forms will reflect the new system.

Please note that you will receive your newsletters by e-mail from autumn 2017. If you wish to receive the newsletter by post, you will need to complete the postal option form and make the extra payment of £8 in addition to your subscription. The postal option form will be in the AGM issue in the autumn and will also be available on the society's website from the autumn. For those members who pay by standing order and wish to receive a paper copy, please ensure that you amend your SO from 1 October 2017.

N.B. The hand delivery system will cease after the AGM issue in September and the new postal option is an opt-in system.

February talk

Cliff Passey gave the first talk of 2017 on February 22nd when he spoke on metal detecting. This was a very entertaining & well attended evening, with members given the chance to handle many of the artefacts which had been brought to illustrate the talk.

March talk

Richard McDonald gave a very well received talk on 15th March, when he spoke on important women in Liverpool's history. There are so many women who fulfil this brief that Mr McDonald has enough material for a Part 2, which we hope he will deliver at a later date.

April talk

It was standing room only for Dr Janet Hollinshead's talk on Lord Woolton on April 19th. This was a fascinating talk on Frederick Marquis, born in Salford, later manager of Lewis's store in Liverpool, then wartime Minister of Food & ennobled as Lord Woolton. His recipe for a pie using root vegetables was promoted throughout the war, & is included in pamphlet number 2. Pamphlets 2 & 3, on the life of Lord Woolton & his home, Hillfoot House, were on sale at the talk but sold out very quickly. More copies have been printed, & will be available at future talks & at the farmers market stall.

The size of the audience has prompted the WS to ask if the larger room downstairs at the club could be used for all future talks. This is being considered, & we will keep members informed.

Dates for your diary

Wednesday 17th May, Tom Preston: Fred Waldron & the Wayfarer

Local historian, Tom Preston will be our speaker in May, with engineer extraordinary Fred Waldron as his subject. Fred Waldron was chief engineer at Pilkington's glass from 1911 to the 1940s. He invented & designed torpedo boats & marine engines, factories & industrial processes, & was an advisor to the Ford motor company in Detroit, USA. Perhaps his most extraordinary achievement was designing & building all parts of a saloon car in the 1930s. This promises to be a fascinating talk on a little known subject.

Wednesday 21st June: Quiz Night

In a new departure for the society the event in June will take the form of a quiz night. We are inviting members & non-members to come along, individually or in groups to make up a team & take part in in an informal evening of quizzing on general knowledge & local history. There will be a (very small) prize for the winning team.

Thursday 13th July: Dr Andrew Zsigmond, The Hungarian Revolution of 1956 & my subsequent escape

Local resident & WS member Dr Andrew Zsigmond will be talking of his escape from Hungary in 1956, & his eventual arrival in England.

This is another innovation for the Woolton Society: an afternoon talk in the Simon Peter Centre on Church Road. We realise that many members would appreciate a daytime talk, & also that some experience mobility issues. The Simon Peter Centre has disabled access, & is available midafternoon, so we are trying out this change of time & venue as a service to our members.

This talk will begin at 2.30pm at the Simon Peter Centre, & refreshments will be available.

Sunday 30th July: Guided walk: Ropewalks & Regeneration

Blue Badge guide Marie Passey will lead a two hour walk around the centre of the city, taking in Chinatown, the Ropewalks area, & a shelter for sedan chairs! The walk will be setting off from the John Lewis store, Liverpool One, at 2pm on Sunday 30th July.

The walk is limited to 25 places so booking is essential, with a payment of £5 per person. Please contact Viv Hicks on 428 3268 to reserve a place, or see committee members, with payment, at any talk.

All Woolton Society talks are free, & open to non-members as well as members. We have the use of a downstairs room at the Village Club, with the talks of May & June starting at 7.30pm. The July talk will be at the Simon Peter Centre on Church Road, with a start of 2.30pm. The walk in July will set off from the John Lewis store, Liverpool One at 2pm on Sunday 30th July. A payment of £5 is required for the guided walk.

Society publications

The society now has three pamphlets to its name, as well as two books.

Pamphlet 2, "Who was Lord Woolton?" was on sale at the talk of the same name in April, given by Dr Janet Hollinshead. Also on sale at the April talk was pamphlet 3 "Hillfoot House," the Liverpool home of Lord Woolton. Both pamphlets sold out & have been reprinted for future events. Pamphlet 1, "Who Lived at Woolton Hall" has been selling briskly since its first publication & has been reprinted four times.

Future pamphlets will be on The Beatles in Woolton, & also education & medical care in the village. All pamphlets are priced at £1, & available at talks as well as at our stall at the regular farmers markets

The book, "Woolton Stone & Liverpool Cathedral", priced at £5 was published in 2016, & is stocked by the cathedral bookshop. Our bestseller is "A History of Much Woolton", first published in 1975 & reprinted in 2012, priced at £3, & very popular with students of local history.

Both books are available at Brown's on Woolton Street, as well as at all society events.

Matters arising from the last newsletter

The report of the inventor of the police wireless system in issue 341 brought a swift response from a reader, a former policeman, & he is now advising the family of Edgar Menzies in having his work recognised officially. We shall report in future issues of any progress made.

The Prize Certificate awarded to Florence Lawton in 1915 which was reproduced on the back page has also produced a response from a member who has examined the census returns.

The 1911 census shows a Lawson family living at 5 Castle Street in Woolton.

This would have made Florence 10 years old in 1915 at the time of the certificate, & so the likely recipient of the award.

An appeal for information.

Do any readers have information about the former Liverpool Convalescent Hospital? It is now Woolton Manor Care Home, but was used some 50 years ago as The United Liverpool Hospitals' Nurses Preliminary Training College.

It would be useful to hear from anyone who knows something about the institution during these years - such as how many nurses were there? How long did they stay there? When exactly did the college close? Was anyone there themselves, or had a family member there? Does anyone have a photograph of the nurses there?

Environment, Planning News & Applications

Public Right of Way, Glenacres/Byron Court Update

Our thanks to members & residents who responded to our request to contact the council about the PRoW as reported in issue 341. Liverpool City Council received 5 objections to its Definitive Map Modification Order, & 40 letters of support for the order.

The correspondence will now be referred by the council to the Planning Inspectorate. If the order is confirmed then the footpath from Acrefield Road to Woolton Park will be officially designated as Public Right of Way number 77, & the brick wall on the Byron Court boundary will have to be demolished or modified.

We will keep members informed of all developments.

Traffic Report

In April several society committee members took a walk to assess the traffic situation around two local schools, together with Community Support Officer Liam Brown & Councillor Alice Bennett. CSO Brown reported complaints from residents in the Woolton Hill Road area, with instances of selfish parking, & cars stopping on zigzag lines. On Church Road the group observed vehicles blocking the pavement & junctions, & were informed that parents needed their cars in order to take their children to & from school. Who knew that children could no longer walk? The Magical Mystery Tour bus was early on this particular day, so we were spared the gridlock which occurs most days at 3.30pm.

Councillor Bennett also took the opportunity to photograph some of the many craters which make Church Road possibly the worst maintained highway in the city. All our local councillors report daily complaints about the state of the roads in the village. Let us hope that one day Woolton will reach the top of the list for road improvements.

Village news

As shown in the planning applications, there has been some interest shown in the site of the former HSBC bank. The excellent Istanbul restaurant has expanded its premises, but painted the exterior a vibrant shade of lilac which has caused comment on the society's website. Knolle Park has seen

some demolition work, but no building news as yet. The former library building has been put up for auction, with a guide price of £250,000.

Bus Service

The 173 bus will be replaced in July by a re-routed 174 service. This will run on a loop from Halewood Road, Out Lane, Kings Drive, Woolton Village, Church Road, Woolton Hill Road, Gateacre Brow & Grange Lane, but will no longer reach Sefton Park.

Woolton in Bloom

There is concern about the amount of vandalism in the village recently, with WIB planters overturned & plants spilled. It should be remembered that all planting is done by volunteers, with no help from council funds, & that any vandalism reflects very badly on the village, & means more work for those who have to clear up.
